

So, I've sat here most of the morning contemplating what to share with you, and as Julie can testify from our discussion, there are several great directions that we could go in to go "higher".

It was delightful to me yesterday to spend the morning talking about things that are "God breathed" and talking about David. And, if you were present to hear it or joined us on the Livestream or even listened

later after it was uploaded to our website, you are aware that the point of all that we went through is that God didn't just suddenly stop speaking by The Spirit to men. Just because the last entries into the compilation of "the scriptures" were written by John somewhere in the early 90sAD doesn't mean that God just stopped talking, revealing Himself, to man. God's still speaking "by The Spirit", as Jesus said of David, ([Mt 22:43](#)) to us! Men and women still speak infallible Truths, building up the knowledge of God and instructing us out from The Spirit with words that are, *theopneustos*, "God breathed". ([2Tim 3:16](#)) We can speak words that are God Breathed and we can write songs that are God breathed just like David! This hasn't "passed away", God speaks today!

Yesterday we used some verses from the 1st chapter of Hebrews as an example to demonstrate what we were talking about. Jesus quoted David writing prophetically about Messiah, and the writer of Hebrews picked up on it too. But I purposefully left out one example of God speaking through men many centuries before it "happens". This one has 2 curious parts, and some of you may find this inspiring to consider, as I do.

Then again, when He brings the Firstborn into the world, He says, 'Let all the angels of God worship him.' ([Heb 1:6](#)) Now, when you try to go look this up to find out what scripture the writer is referencing, it's a bit tough. You may eventually find that it's [Deut 32:43](#). So now you go look it up, but that's not how it reads. In fact, there's only a few translations that contain this phrase, so how can this be? Intrigued?

The translations that contain what the writer of Hebrews is quoting are working from the Septuagint rather than Hebrew texts. Now remember what I said about "centuries before it happens"? Deuteronomy records Moses speaking God breathed prophetic words to the children of Israel as he is about to move on and they are about to enter the Promised Land. That would be around 1250 BC. The Septuagint was written around 1000 years later. It would appear that God "breathed" some words that weren't written before! Then, a couple of hundred years later it's written down for us so we can contemplate all these things. Now let's talk about what it means...

Some folks have said, and I've considered it also, that the statement is referring to Adam. But technically, Adam was formed and then brought to life, not "born". Then there's the word, *oukoumene*, which means "inhabited earth". The earth was not yet "inhabited" when Adam and Eve were in the garden. So, it's referring to Jesus. But when?

Are we talking about Jesus at His actual birth? Luke records the angelic visitation to the shepherds that night at Bethlehem. They were praising God and declaring great joy and peace. And the angles ministered to Him, but neither time does it say that they worshipped Him.

But, now being the exact expression, the radiant reflection of The Father; upholding all things though the power of His word; being seated in the right hand the state of exalted greatness; and being so much more superior than the angels, having obtained a more excellence name that they ([Heb 1:3-4](#)), I guarantee they are still worshipping Him!

Now, aren't you thrilled that God *breathed* into the writer of Hebrews to put this in there so that we can see into this marvelous Truth? Yeah, me too!
